Sun Protection

Role	Responsibilities
Nominated Supervisor	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Use a combination of sun protection measures whenever UV levels reach 3 or above. Provide adequate shade in all outdoor play areas and regularly assess and maintain shade structures. Ensure daily UV checks using the Bureau of Meteorology or SunSmart app, and adjust outdoor times accordingly. Require sun-safe hats and clothing that protect the face, neck, shoulders and limbs. Ensure SPF 30+ or higher, broad-spectrum, water-resistant sunscreen is applied 20 minutes before outdoor play and reapplied every two hours. Encourage children to learn about and take part in sun safety, such as checking UV levels or reminding peers to wear hats. Model positive sun protection practices — all educators, staff, and volunteers wear hats, protective clothing, and sunscreen outdoors. Communicate sun protection expectations to families and include information in enrolment packs, newsletters, and signage.
Educators and Staff	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Plan outdoor experiences in shaded areas and adjust play locations throughout the day to follow the shade. Conduct surface temperature checks in hot weather to prevent burns from play surfaces or equipment. Keep children indoors or in full shade when UV levels are extreme or surfaces are dangerously hot. Record and monitor sunscreen use and shade checks as part of daily routines. Supervise and support children to develop sun-safe habits.
Families	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Provide a labelled, sun-safe hat and appropriate clothing for their child each day. Provide an alternative sunscreen to service sunscreen for allergy reasons.



Water Play

Role	Responsibilities
Nominated Supervisor	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Identify and manage all water hazards, including sinks, buckets, troughs, fish tanks, water play tubs, and outdoor puddles. Ensure no swimming pools or permanent water features are on-site. Complete a risk assessment for all water-based activities, including excursions. Maintain active supervision during any water play — educators must be within arm's length (1–2 metres) and maintain clear visual contact. Empty and store portable water play items (e.g., tubs, troughs, buckets) immediately after use. Keep outdoor play areas fenced off from natural or artificial water sources such as ponds, creeks, or drains. Clean and disinfect all water play equipment after use, ensuring hygienic water quality. Display a CPR guide near any water hazard or water play area.
Educators and Staff	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Never leave children unsupervised near water. Ensure written family consent before children participate in any water-based experience. Increase educator-to-child ratios when required by risk assessment. Remove or cover water hazards after rain or outdoor cleaning. Ensure children with open sores, diarrhoea, or infections do not participate in water play. Reinforce water safety rules with children through conversations and play.
Families	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Support the service's water safety guidelines and provide appropriate swim wear or clothing when required.
